EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This destination sector fact sheet provides key trade and investment related statistics for the Garden Route district municipality. Specifically, it shows the Garden Route district's area, population, employment, trade, investment, and tourism trends with the rest of the world. The key highlights are provided below:

ECONOMY

- In 2021, the Garden Route district economy grew by 4.68% as recovery from the adverse impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic got underway.
- The George local municipality was the largest contributor to GDP in the Garden Route district in 2021, accounting for 40.23% of regional GDP, followed by Mossel Bay and Oudtshoorn, which accounted for 17.55% and 12.74%, respectively.
- The finance, insurance, real estate, and business services sector was the largest contributor to the Garden Route's GDP in 2021, accounting for 32.78%, followed by the wholesale and retail trade, catering, and accommodation sector at 14.78%, and the manufacturing sector at 13.35%.
- The food, beverages and tobacco sector were the largest contributor to the Garden Route's manufacturing sector, accounting for 26.71% of output in 2021.
- Business services was the largest contributor to the Garden Route's services sector, accounting for 35.03% of output in 2021.

TRADE

- Total export receipts for the Garden Route amounted to ZARR5.78 billion in 2021, an increase of 14.50% on 2020s value of ZAR5.04bn. Imports in turn posted a 42.63% y-o-y growth to a cost of ZAR9.6 billion in 2021, up from ZAR6.8 billion in 2020.
- The United Kingdom has been the top destination market for Garden Route exports over the past five years. More recently, ZAR611.94m worth of exports were destined for the UK in 2021, equivalent to 10.60% of global exports in 2021.
- Zimbabwe was the only country from the African continent that featured among the district's top 10 destination markets, with ZAR16.61 million worth of grain sorghum products destined for this country in 2021.
- The top import source market for the region in 2021 was India, with ZAR1,992.79m worth of products imported into the region in 2021. This was equivalent to 20.71% of global imports in the said year.

INVESTMENT

 Between January 2010 and October 2022, seven foreign direct investment projects with a combined value of ZAR22.97bn were recorded into the Garden Route. These projects created a total of 580 jobs.
 Four of these projects originated from European countries, two projects were from the United States, and one from China.

TOURISM

- The 4 participating Garden Route & Klein Karoo attractions received a total of 195 082 visitors over the period January to June 2022. During the first half of 2022, January saw the highest recorded number of visitors (53 160 visitors) to the region followed by March (38 579 visitors) and April (37 664 visitors).
- The top three domestic markets were the Western Cape (50.7%), Gauteng (11.9%) and KwaZulu-Natal (10.4%).
- The United States (20.0%), France (14.3%), Germany (14.3%), UK (14.3%), and Switzerland (11.4%) were the top source countries for visitors into the Garden Route and Klein Karoo in 2021.

Cape Town and the Western Cape – A Leading Regional Economy

1. AREA

The Garden Route district is one of six districts located in the Western Cape and it is located in the south-east of the province. The district occupies a total land area of 23,331km² and has a population of 626, 649 people. By population, the largest group in the district are Coloured people (53.77%), followed by Black Africans (29.55%) and Whites (16.53%). The district is comprised of seven municipalities, namely, Kannaland, Hessequa, Mossel Bay, George, Oudtshoorn, Bitou, and Knysna.



2.1. DEMOGRAPHICS

With a population of 626, 649 in 2021, the Garden Route district was the third most populous district in the Western Cape, after the City of Cape Town, and the Cape Winelands district. The Garden Route's population is estimated to have grown by an annual average annual growth rate of 1.07% from 2017 to 2021.

FIGURE 2: GARDEN ROUTE DISTRICT POPULATION, 2012 - 2021





The table below shows the Garden Route district's population breakdown by racial groups. In 2021, the Coloured population represented the largest racial group, accounting for 53.67%, followed by the African population (29.55%), and White population who accounted for 16.35%. Asian/Indians were a minority group within the Garden Route representing 0.43% of the population. However, within this grouping, a slight increment in number has been witnessed over the years with the Asians/Indians growing 1.88% y-o-y from 2,622 in 2020 to 2,671 in 2021.


FIGURE 3: GARDEN ROUTE POPULATION BY AGE & GENDER, 2021

Within the Garden Route district, the George local municipality recorded the biggest population between 2012 and 2021. This local municipality recorded a population of 212, 080 in 2021, followed by the Oudtshoorn and Mossel Bay local municipalities with 102, 685 and 98, 556 people, respectively.

Education

Around 21.60% of Garden Route's population was recorded to have matric (Grade 12) in 2021. The percentage of the population with no schooling totalled 7.61% in 2021. Those with bachelors, masters and higher education degrees only made up 2.09%.

2.2. EMPLOYMENT

The table below provides a snapshot of indicators for employment in the Garden Route district in 2021. The unemployment rate at this time was 21.06%, with 203, 493 people employed from a working age population of 406, 194 people.

The Garden Route's wholesale and retail trade, catering and accommodation sector was the largest employer in 2021 with 40, 307 people, followed by the finance, insurance, real estate, and business services, which employed 39, 673 people. The community, social and personal services sector in turn employed 47, 696 people.

In terms of sector employment by skills, the finance, insurance, real estate, and business services sector employed the largest number of highly skilled people (14, 354). While the wholesale and retail trade, catering and accommodation sector employed mostly the semi-skilled (17, 044). Both the low skilled and informally employed were found in the community, social and personal services sector.

3. ECONOMIC OVERVIEW

Economic growth in the district depends on effective capitalizing of competitive advantages. The district is an ideal location for various agricultural and niche activities due to its topographical and climatic diversity. Agricultural activities include dairy, fruit, vegetable, and sheep products, as well as unique products like ostriches, forestry products, aloe, hops, and essential oils. Agro-processing and forestry form a large part of the manufacturing base and are supported by niche industries. The construction industry is well supported by tourism and real estate investments which have continued to increase. The upgrading of facilities has also contributed to the growth of this sector.

In 2021, the Garden Route economy experienced growth of 4,68%, recovering from the adverse effects of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, which resulted in the economy contracting by -6.05% in the said year.





FIGURE 7: GARDEN ROUTE GVA & GROWTH, 2012-2021

The figure below shows the contribution share of Garden Route local municipalities to regional GDP for the period 2012 to 2021. The George local municipality has always been the largest contributor to GVA in the Garden Route district. In 2021, George contributed ZAR17.44bn to the Garden Route district, accounting for 40.23% of total GVA. Mossel Bay and Oudtshoorn were the second and third largest contributors to the district's GVA, at a value of at ZAR7.61bn and ZAR5.52bn, respectively.

Sector GVA

The finance, insurance, real estate, and business services sector was the largest contributor to the Garden Route's GDP in 2021, accounting for 32.78% of total GVA. It was followed by the wholesale and retail trade, catering, and accommodation sector at 14.78%, and the manufacturing sector at 13.35%.



Sub-Sector Distribution

For contribution to GVA by sub-sector, business services were the largest contributor in 2021, accounting for 26.22% of output. This was followed by wholesale and retail trade at 13.84%, and community, social and personal services at 10.19%.

FIGURE 9: GARDEN ROUTE SECTOR DISTRIBUTION, 2021



Manufacturing Sector breakdown

The figure below shows the contribution share of the Garden Route's manufacturing sub-sectors to the district's GVA for 2021. The figure shows that:

- The food and beverages and tobacco sub-sector was the largest contributor to the Garden Route's manufacturing sector accounting for 26.71%, followed by
- Petroleum products, chemicals, rubber and plastic sub-sector, accounting for 17.97%, and
- Furniture; other manufacturing sub-sector, accounting for 13.83%.



Services Sector Breakdown

The figure below shows the contribution share of the Garden Route's services sub-sectors to the district's GVA for 2021. The figure shows that:

- Business services was the largest contributor to Garden Route's services sector, accounting for 35.03%;
 followed by
- Wholesale and retail trade, accounting for 18.50%; and
- Community, social and personal services, accounting for 18.50%.



4. TRADE

Except for 2020 and 2021, the Garden Route has maintained a positive trade balance over the past decade. For the period under review, the largest export earnings were recorded in 2021, with export receipts recording a 14.50% y-o-y increase to value of ZAR5.8bn, up from ZAR5bn earned in 2020. Imports in turn surged by 42.63% y-o-y to a cost of ZAR9.6bn in 2021, from ZAR6.8bn accrued in 2020. The trade shortfall widened as a result, more than doubling to a deficit of ZAR3.9bn in 2021.

FIGURE 12: GARDEN ROUTE'S GLOBAL TRADE, 2012-2021




Key Trade Markets

Figure 13 below presents the top ten global destination markets for products exported from the Garden Route between 2017 and 2021. Zimbabwe was the only country from the African continent that featured among the district's top 10 destination markets.


In 2021, the United Kingdom was the top destination market for exported products from the Garden Route, accounting for a 10.60% share of total export earnings. The United States (8.76%) and the Netherlands (7.69%) ranked second and third, respectively.

FIGURE 13: TOP 10 EXPORT MARKETS FOR THE GARDEN ROUTE, 2017-2021




The leading import source market for the Garden Route in 2021 period was India, accounting for a 20.71% share of total imports. China (11.59%) and Qatar (6.75%) ranked second and third respectively. Mozambique was the only African country in the top ten source markets for imported products into the Garden Route in 2021.

The top ten exported products from the Garden Route accounted for 72.89% of the district's total exports in 2021. Fresh apples, pears, and quinces (with a share of 25.05%) were the leading export category from the Garden Route during the period under consideration. Fresh, or dried citrus fruits, were the second largest export product category (18.76%), followed by leather further prepared after tanning or crusting (7.59%).

In turn, the Garden Route's top ten imported products accounted for 82.11% of the district's total import costs in 2021. The top three products imported into the Garden Route during this period were Refined petroleum oils (73.23%), New pneumatic tyres of rubber (2.41%), and Automatic data processing machines (11.15%).

5. INVESTMENTS

The Garden Route district attracted seven FDI projects from seven multinational companies over the period 2003 to October 2022. The cumulative value of this investment reached a total of ZAR22.97bn over this period and created 580 jobs in the region. The majority of FDI projects were invested into Mossel Bay, which attracted five out of the seven projects invested, while George and Knysna each attracted one project over the period 2003 to October 2022.

The energy sector attracted two out of the seven projects, while the agribusiness sector attracted one, and retail trade and consumer goods sectors each attracted one project over the period under review.

The United States was the top source market for FDI into the Garden Route, with two projects invested. The largest FDI project emanated from Norway, where Equinor invested one project into Mossel Bay in the energy sector in 2004, with a total capex of ZAR21.24bn over the period January 2003 to July 2022.

6. TOURISM

Stretching from Witsand to Plettenberg Bay, Oudtshoorn, Calitzdorp and Ladismith on the world-renowned Route 62, the Garden Route and Klein Karoo is a place of immense natural beauty, offering and abundance of adventure, world class golf courses and award-winning dining experiences. This section provides an overview of the tourism activity in the Garden Route and Klein Karoo based on airport passenger movement, visits to selected local attractions, visitor trends from regional tracking surveys and mobile-location data insights in selected towns. It is vital to note that this section does not represent tourism flows for the region in its entirety but only represents a selected sample size of visitors.

6.1. Performance of Attractions

The four participating Garden Route & Klein Karoo attractions received a total of 195 082 visitors over the period January to June 2022. Visitor numbers show an overall increase of 48% over the same period in 2021 and recovered to 59% of what it was in 2019. During the first half of 2022, January saw the highest recorded number of visitors (53 160 visitors) to the region followed by March (38 579 visitors) and April (37 664 visitors).

6.2. Origin of Visitors

The top five international markets who responded to the regional tracking surveys at the respective Garden Route Visitor Information Centres (VICs) included the United States (20.0%), France (14.3%), Germany (14.3%), UK (14.3%), and 11.4% from Switzerland.

Domestic visitors made up 79.3% of visitors surveyed at the Garden Route. The top three domestic markets were Western Cape (50.7%), Gauteng (11.9%) and KwaZulu-Natal (10.4%).





FIGURE 18: TOP INTERNATIONAL VISITORS TO THE GARDEN ROUTE & KELIN KAROO, 2021


6.3. Overnight Stays

7. FILM



Whether you are looking for white beaches, rugged rocky coastlines, lagoons, lakes, mystic forests, mountains, vibrant pastures, or even semi-arid desert, the Garden Route has it all. World-renowned as a tourist destination with a Mediterranean climate, the region is the ideal location for your next production. It has an abundance of diverse, scenic landscapes in close geographic proximity, and well-developed infrastructure.

KEY INFORMATION

There is a regional process working towards establishing the Garden Route and Klein Karoo Film Office. Until the film office is in place, producers can contact info@grkk-filmoffice.co.za which is under the care of the Garden Route Regional Municipality. Alternatively, producers can contact the office for assistance in obtaining the necessary permits. The Garden Route and Klein Karoo Film Office is working with the Garden Route district Municipality to obtain permits.

Permits: During productions, when shooting on public property, or if the shoot has an impact on others or the environment, one must obtain a permit. This includes:

- Commercials
- If filming has an impact on traffic/pedestrians
- If planning to use dollys, wires, tripods, generators etc.
- If planning to use public spaces in a different/special way

For access to Cape Nature and SANParks, the normal processes still must be followed. There are more options available though, e.g., a larger variety of beaches than in some cities
