PORT INFRASTRUCTURE & SERVICES

Port of Cape Town

The Port of Cape Town is the premier port for the Western Cape region, providing a wide range of round-the-clock port operations. With a land area of 253 ha and a water area of 9163 ha, the port is well-equipped to provide world-class service to a variety of sectors, including containers, general cargo, fresh produce and fishing, as well as the burgeoning offshore oil and gas industry.

Local and international demand for bunkering and ship repair is growing rapidly, and Cape Town boasts three ship repair facilities, one of which includes the largest dry dock in Southern Africa. The port also provides comprehensive marine services: navigation, towage, pilotage, berthing, and pollution control.

Cape Town is ideally positioned as a hub linking the Americas and Europe with Asia, the Far East and Australia. As a result, a large percentage of cargo handled is transhipment cargo for onward transit. South Africa's growing exports, particularly fresh fruit, perishables and frozen produce, travel to global destinations via the Port of Cape Town.

Cargoes fall into four clusters: containers, liquid bulk, dry bulk and break-bulk. Facilities and infrastructure include world-class container, multi-purpose and fresh produce terminals renowned for their quality. Upgrades are ongoing to meet new and increasing demand.

Pilotage

- Pilotage is compulsory.
- Fifteen minutes prior to entering the Traffic Separation Scheme, advance notice to be given to Port Control through VHF Radio on Channel 14.
- Pilot ladders must comply with SOLAS regulations.
- All vessels with a freeboard in excess of nine meters must have an accommodation ladder rigged in conjunction with the pilot ladder.
- · Man ropes must be provided.
- The pilot boarding area is located off the Fairway Buoy and the ships master should radio for instructions.

Length & Condition of the Quayside

The Cape Town Cruise Terminal is situated at E-Berth area, and has a promulgated draft of 10.5 m Bollard Pull of 50 tons and berth length of 226 m.

Depth of Harbour Entrances

The depth at the entrance channel is 15.9 m; with a tidal draft of 12.8 m at the entrance to the Duncan Dock.

Port Tugs

- There are two pilot boats, twin screw engines
- The port operates four Voith Schneider propelled tugs, each with a bollard pull of approximately 40 tonnes
- Tugs join vessels approximately 0,25 miles from the harbour entrance
- All tugs are fitted for fire-fighting and salvage
- There is also a smaller tug, a conventional, twinscrew with an approximately 11 tonnes bollard pull

Size of the Bollards

Bollard Pull of 50 tonnes and 18 m apart.

Tide

The tide range at Cape Town is 1.5 m

Cape Town Cruise Terminal

Immigration

Immigration processes are conducted for all vessels arriving via and departing for international waters. Processing takes place via desktop computers and fibre optic links into the government database.

Shuttle Services

- No complimentary shuttle service
- The Silo District is the closest shopping and restaurant area and is located within a 5-minute walk
- Shipping agents can arrange their own shuttle service to and from the V&A Waterfront. Coach drop-off and parking is available at the Victoria Wharf Shopping Centre situated 5 – 10 minutes' drive from the Cape Town Cruise Terminal

Public Transport Access

- Taxis, metered and e-hailing, available at Cape Town Cruise Terminal building
- A MyCiTi bus station is located 150 meters from the Cape Town Cruise Terminal

Other Transport Options

- City Sightseeing stop (open-top tourist bus) (5-minute walk, located at the Silo District)
- Bicycle rental (5-minute walk, located at the Silo District)
- Car hire (15-minute walk, located at the Quays District)

Mossel Bay

The Port of Mossel Bay, situated halfway between Cape Town and Port Elizabeth, approximately 400 km east of Cape Town, is the only South African port that operates two offshore mooring points within port limits.

The main commodities handled are petroleum products exported through the offshore moorings and fresh fish products. It also serves as an offshore supply vessel base for one of its key clients, PetroSA. The port can accommodate passenger and project vessels.

Accessible by road and railway networks, the Port of Mossel Bay is an excellent connection point to the consumer markets and industrial zones of the Western Cape.

Tourism is also a booming industry, with fully booked accommodation in the holiday months.

The N2 national road connects Mossel Bay with Cape Town and George. The closest domestic airport is George (approximately 50km away), which has flights to all major airports within South Africa.

Mossel Bay forms part of the Garden Route – a major tourist attraction in the Western Cape and is a natural entry or exit point for a Garden Route itinerary.

Shuttle Services

Mossel Bay offers a convenient and welcoming arrival experience for cruise passengers. The port is centrally located within the town's CBD, with the Mossel Bay Tourism Office just a short walk from the docking area. While the route is slightly steep for some elderly visitors, most passengers enjoy the easy access on foot. To ensure ongoing comfort and convenience for visitors, an information desk is stationed at the harbour where trained staff can assist in arranging reputable private taxis for guests who prefer not to walk.

It is important to note that, unlike many other destinations, cruise passengers arriving in Mossel Bay are already within the heart of the town. The port opens directly into the CBD, placing visitors within walking distance (approximately 5 km radius) of major attractions, shops, restaurants, museums, and coastal viewpoints. With its compact layout, friendly atmosphere, and close proximity between the port and points of interest, Mossel Bay offers one of the most accessible and walkable areas to explore.

Public Transport Access

While Mossel Bay does not have a formal public transport system, our private transport network operates efficiently during cruise ship visits. Mossel Bay Tourism coordinates standby private taxis on cruise days, ensuring reliable service and smooth passenger flow between the port, town, and nearby attractions.

Other Transport Options

For passengers who have not pre-booked excursions and wish to explore at their own pace, private taxis can be arranged on-site at the information area at the dock or at the Mossel Bay Tourism office itself.

Port limits stretch from the Cape St. Blaize lighthouse to the little Brak river mouth, along the high-water mark. The total area is approximately 37 km2.

Saldanha Bay

The Port of Saldanha Bay, located on South Africa's West Coast, stands as the deepest and largest natural port in Southern Africa, with a depth of 23 meters and partial protection from a long artificial breakwater. Its natural deep-water capacity enables it to accommodate some of the world's largest bulk carriers, including Very Large Ore Carriers (VLOCs) and Very Large Crude Carriers (VLCCs) of up to 300,000 dwt.

Purpose-built in the 1970s to support the iron ore industry, Saldanha Bay has evolved into Africa's largest iron ore export facility, handling approximately 86% of South Africa's iron ore exports annually. A key feature of this port is its dedicated rail infrastructure, which includes a purpose-built rail link to a jetty bulk loading facility and the world's longest heavy haul rail line, connecting the port directly to South Africa's iron ore mines ensuring efficient, high-volume throughput.

Beyond dry bulk, the port has expanded to include infrastructure for crude oil imports, break-bulk cargo, and offshore oil and gas services. Facilities such as the Offshore Supply Base (OSSB), Mossgas Jetty, and Berth 205 position Saldanha Bay as a strategic hub for servicing offshore energy operations. Its location also makes it a vital support base for oil and gas fields along both the West and East African coasts.

With its scale, infrastructure, and connectivity, Saldanha Bay is a cornerstone of South Africa's maritime economy and a key asset in the Western Cape's ambition to become a leading cruise and commercial shipping region.

Immigration

Immigration clearance takes place at Yachtport, which serves as the designated landing point for guests arriving via Zodiac transfers from anchored vessels. The immigration team coordinates the on-site setup and procedures to ensure a smooth and efficient passenger entry process.

Accessibility

Access to the port is requested through the Saldanha Bay Transnet Ports Authority's Security Department. It is advisable to do the arrangements some days before the day requested.

Amenities

The Saldanha Bay Yachtport is situated in a sheltered area of Smitswinkelbaai within the harbour of Saldanha Bay, approximately 60 nautical miles north-west of Cape Town.

- Mooring / berthing: visitor swing moorings are usually available.
- Utilities & basic services: electricity, water, showers, restrooms, Wi-Fi.
- Social / club-house style amenities: bar, kitchen / self-catering kitchen, BBQ ("braai") area.
- Yard & repair / maintenance facilities: hull cleaning, antifouling, general refit & repair works.
- Haul-out capability: for monohulls with up to 4.0 m beam and ~11 tonnes displacement, and catamarans up to ~40 ft.

Parking Arrangements

Parking is available at Yachtport. If there are too many vehicles are queued on the outside and routed in for pickups.

Coach Parking

Coaches are parked at Yachtport and are properly controlled by the tour guides.

Shuttle Services

There are shuttle services in Saldanha Bay that can be arranged via the local DMC.

Public Transport Access

There is no access for public transport inside the port unless arranged by the shipping agent. All transport coming into the port must have acquired the permission to do so. Public transport can be accessed at the Sea Harvest Quay (located on the southwestern side of the Harbour at Government Jetty, Saldanha Road), and in the town of Saldanha.

Other transport options are available through arrangements with our local DMCs and tour operators.

Total Port Area

Port limits extend across Saldanha Bay, encompassing both land and water areas. The total port area is approximately 193 km².



Foreign Exchange

It is important to note that you can only pay in Rands in South Africa. Money can be exchanged at the airport, commercial banks, Rennies Travel and American Express.

These can be found in most shopping centres in the Western Cape. You may also find exchange facilities in some hotels.

Banking hours are: 9am - 3.30pm (weekdays) and 8.30am - 11am (Saturdays) and are closed on Sundays and Public Holidays.

All major credit cards are accepted at most establishments in the Western Cape.

Duty-Free Shopping

All stores must charge the Value Added Tax (VAT) of 15% that is levied on the purchase of most goods in South Africa. As a foreign visitor you may apply for a refund of the VAT you pay while in the country provided you apply before you depart. Ensure that you receive your tax receipts for all purchases made, to claim your VAT refund, present all your tax receipts to the VAT administrator at your point of departure.

Safety Tips

- Avoid walking in deserted and dark places at night.
- Never allow strangers to assist you in any way at ATMs
- At night, park in a secure and well-lit area with street quards
- Keep photocopies and all valuable documents in a safe place.


Drinking Water

Water Security


The V&A Waterfront's Seawater Desalination Plant is a key facility ensuring water security and climate resilience in the precinct. The plant uses advanced reverse osmosis technology to make seawater safe for consumption and supplies 3.3 MLD (million liters per day) of water into the precinct.

Responsible Waste Management

The V&A Waterfront's Waste Recovery and Recycling Centre aims to curb the precinct's impact on overflowing landfills. It does so with the support of a neighbourhood-wide three-bin system, waste-tracking measures and incentives for tenants and visitors to segregate their waste.

Sea Water Cooling

The Silo District Seawater Cooling Plant is an innovative and sustainable cooling system that harnesses cold seawater from the harbour to regulate temperatures in nearby buildings. This system significantly reduces reliance on traditional air conditioning, lowering energy consumption and carbon emissions.
